The state-by-state table shows the projected distribution of Title I and IDEA Part B grants.

- **Title I** (\$13 billion): Title I grants to local educational agencies provide supplemental education funding, especially in high-poverty areas, for programs that provide extra academic support to help raise student achievement.
- **IDEA** (\$11.7 billion): The Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) grants provide funding to assist states and school districts with the costs of special education for the estimated 6.8 million students with disabilities.
